

Do you know which country is known by FOUR different names?



Even many adults are confused about exactly where this country is and why it is known by so many different names! We are talking about **England**. England consists of the majority of a large island off the northwest coast of mainland Europe. The western part of that island was for many years the separate country of Wales (still many older people speak the Welsh language, which is totally different from English!) and the two countries together make up Britain. The northern part of the island was also a separate country for centuries, and is known as Scotland, and when included with England and Wales, makes up Great Britain. There is a smaller island (called Ireland) to the west of the main one, and the northern part of that island, when included with Great Britain, is known as the United Kingdom! So people who live in England actually live in four "countries"!

The flag of the United Kingdom is actually made up of the flags of England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland. These are each different crosses on different colored backgrounds. Here is the English flag, a red cross on white,

that is called the Cross of St. George:



Now, can you find it in the combined flag, which is called the Union Jack?



The whole of the United Kingdom (or UK) is about the size of the state of Oregon and has a population of about 60 million, making it one of the larger countries in Europe. However,



because it is not part of mainland Europe, the UK has always had a very different history through the centuries, and most British people are not willing to become totally absorbed into Continental Europe's affairs.

The UK has a rich history which has left many reminders that can still be seen all around the country to this day – walls and houses from Roman times (over 2,000 years ago!); castles

from 1066, when the Normans, from France, conquered the land; and thousands of well-preserved houses and relics from the past 1,000 years of its fascinating growth and development into a country that once ruled all around the world.



During the past 500 years, there have been several huge revivals around the UK that completely changed the course of history. As people in whole areas of the country repented and turned to God, there were sweeping social

reforms - conditions in prisons and slums (very poor areas) were improved; Sunday school was started to teach children; and hundreds of Christians became missionaries to take the Gospel around the world. The whole country was divided into "parishes" each under the care of a local church and pastor (called a vicar). Laws and the government developed, based on Biblical principles, and these have become the foundation of hundreds of later governments in countries around the world.

But, sadly today, Christianity is not so apparent in England or the UK. This is because it is not enough to just grow up in a Christian family and live in a "Christian" country! Every individual, and every generation, needs a PERSONAL EXPERIENCE AND RELATIONSHIP WITH JESUS CHRIST!



Today in many towns in the UK, there may be 10,000 people but only 5 or 6 churches! In many cities, old church buildings are no longer used for church services – some are used as clubs or as Hindu temples! Some new church groups cannot afford to buy even old buildings to use as churches, they have to rent a school building on Sundays!
